Noh, concert of emotions MAlicia: a future of peace

On August 2nd, Palermo came alive with music and emotion. At the Teatro di Verdura, under the starry summer sky, Noa's clear and intense voice resounded like a hymn to peace, engaging thousands of people from across Sicily and Malta. Not just Rotarians, but citizens, families, young people, and adults who wanted to share a universal message: peace is not a utopia, but a collective duty.

The initiative, promoted by Rotary District 2110, led by Governor Sergio Malizia, had a value that went beyond artistic beauty: all proceeds from the evening were donated to the Rotary Foundation to support humanitarian and international cooperation projects. It was an event that intertwined solidarity, culture, and participation, transforming an August night into a community celebration. A month after the concert, we met with Governor Sergio Malizia to gather his reflections on the emotions, symbols, organizational challenges, and, above all, the legacy an event like this leaves for Palermo and the entire District.

Q1. About a month after the August 2nd concert, what emotions do you feel today when you think back to that evening of music and peace that enchanted Palermo?

A: A little over a month has passed since Noa's concert, and yet...



The echoes of that evening still resonate. It was an experience that went beyond simple music, a moment of pure magic, in which Noa's voice created a bridge between cultures and generations. I remember the atmosphere that was created in the theater: a mix of silence and emotional participation where each song told a story of hope, peace, and humanity. In an era like ours, marked by conflict and division, seeing an artist like Noa, who has always made peace the heart of her message, perform in a historic setting like Palermo, takes on a special significance.

A special meaning. Noa didn't just sing, she taught a life lesson: the beauty of diversity, the power of dialogue, and above all, the importance of believing in a peaceful future. Thinking back on that evening brings back a profound emotion, a sense of inner peace and gratitude. Music in its purest form can truly heal and unite.

D2. White as a universal symbol of peace and the collective moment of cell phone lights made the atmosphere unique. How much these elements have



contributed, in your opinion, to making the event even more attended and evocative?

A: I believe that both the white and the cell phone lights played a fundamental role in transforming Noa's concert into a truly unforgettable experience, making it a collective and deeply moving event. The white dress code created a visual unity among all the spectators, representing active participation in a shared message of peace. The moment of the cell phone lights, on the other hand, added a magical and spiritual dimension. Both of these elements were powerful symbols that made the concert a visual and spiritual celebration of peace. It will remain in all of our memories as an emotion that nourished not only the ear, but also our heart.

D3. How important do you think this concert is, not only as an artistic spectacle, but also as an opportunity for reflection for the Rotary community and the city of Palermo?

A: Noa's concert was an event of great civic and moral value for the entire community, particularly for Rotary and the city, providing us with a powerful opportunity for unity and reflection. I believe the choice of an artist like Noa, who has always conveyed messages of peace and dialogue, offered the Rotary community and all citizens a fundamental common ground on which to come together and share values. This event, in my opinion, also highlighted the importance of volunteering and social commitment, demonstrating that art can be an effective vehicle for supporting important causes. The concert transformed into concrete action, combining aesthetics with ethics. When Rotary chooses to organize an event with an artist like Noa, it isn't simply providing entertainment, but making a statement of values. For the Rotary community, this concert was the perfect embodiment of its "Service above Self" philosophy. Noa, with her personal story and her message of peace, is a living symbol of the spirit of service that characterizes RI.

It is by chance that I chose Noa: an artist who has always put her art at the service of higher ideals.

D4. Organizing this event must not have been easy. What were the main logistical and organizational challenges, and what elements ensured the evening's success?

A: Organizing an event on the scale of Noa's concert in Palermo was a complex challenge, requiring considerable effort and careful planning. The major logistical and organizational obstacles, typical of events of this nature, were overcome thanks to a synergy of key elements that ensured the event's ultimate success.

One of the greatest challenges was managing the spaces and ensuring safety. The Teatro di Verdura, with its capacity of over 2,000 people, required meticulous organization for the influx and outflow of people, while ensuring compliance with safety regulations. Coordination between law enforcement, firefighters, technical staff, and organizational staff was crucial. Ticket sales had to be managed efficiently to avoid overlaps and ensure equitable distribution of seats. Finally, the logistics of the artist and his staff required special attention, from their welcome to the city to the management of the technical equipment. Every detail was taken care of to ensure a seamless and trouble-free experience. The success of the evening is attributable to several factors. The effective collaboration between Rotary, the Municipality of Palermo, and all the sponsors was fundamental. This collaboration allowed for suovercome obstacles and share responsibilities, creating a united and solid front.

Q5. All proceeds, net of costs, were donated to the Rotary Foundation. Can you tell us what concrete projects in the fields of peace, education, and international cooperation will be supported thanks to this collective generosity?

A: All proceeds donated to RF, net of costs, will become a driver of concrete and lasting change worldwide. The funds raised will not only finance a single project, but will be integrated into a global system. RF often complements donations with contributions from other funds, thus multiplying their value and supporting initiatives on an international scale. Thanks to this generosity, the funds raised will help support specific projects in RF's key sectors, aligned with the values of peace, education, and international cooperation. Regarding "Peace," the donation will also support the "Rotary Peace Centers," which offer scholarships to emerging professionals and leaders from around the world to train in peace studies and conflict resolution. Regarding Education, the proceeds will benefit an area of focus that I believe is very important: "Basic Education and Literacy." The funds will be allocated to projects that improve access to basic education in disadvantaged communities. Finally, as regards "International Cooperation," part of the proceeds will help support projects that require large-scale global collaboration. I can proudly say that every ticket



sold has become a brick to build a more just and peaceful future, demonstrating once again that art can become a wonderful force for good.

D6. The turnout was extraordinary, with Rotarians from all over Sicily, but also many citizens. What significance do you attach to this broad and unanimous response?

A: I believe the extraordinary turnout at Noa's concert, with the participation not only of Rotarians from all over Sicily, but also of many non-Rotarian citizens, took on a profound significance that goes beyond the event itself.

This success demonstrated, first and foremost, that Rotary's values resonate in the hearts of all people. The broad and unanimous response demonstrates a thirst for positive values and events that offer not only entertainment, but also a message of hope and peace. Secondly, the large turnout

The citizens' vote highlighted a city's ability to open up and become an ambassador for a universal message. The city of Palermo has demonstrated its ability to host and promote high-value initiatives.

Q7. What role did Rotary clubs play, and how did collaboration develop within the District to make such a large-scale event possible?

A: The establishment of a "Music and Solidarity Commission" was the key. This commission was made up of people from different clubs in the District. It was a true mobilization of resources, expertise, and passion, responsible for overseeing every aspect of the event. The commission acted, planning every phase with precision and vision. Without them, the event's success would not have been possible. Thanks to them, the concert became a concrete demonstration that Rotary is a force capable of generating a positive and lasting impact.

Q8. Another important element was the involvement of young people, with Interact and Rotaract. How significant do you think it is that the younger generations participated in an initiative that combines music, solidarity, and universal values?

A: The inclusion of Rotaract youth contributed significantly to the event's success. Their active involvement, particularly with the crucial role assigned to Rotaract in managing the digital component, took on a profound and multifaceted significance. First, their participation represented a generational bridge of great value. Seeing the new generations get involved in such a meaningful initiative is a powerful signal that demonstrates a strong and vibrant desire to contribute to a better world. Second, entrusting Rotaract youth with managing the digital component was a winning strategic move. They brought expertise and an innovative approach.

These were essential for promoting the event and reaching a broader, more modern audience. Social media, digital campaigns, and online communications are tools that young people now master naturally, and their contributions helped amplify the concert's message in ways that traditional channels could not. Young people are the future of Rotary. I believe this experience was an opportunity for training and personal growth for the young people themselves. Participating in the organization of an event of this magnitude and managing concrete responsibilities prepared them to become Rotary's future leaders. They learned the importance of collaboration, teamwork, and commitment to a worthy cause.

D9. Noa is an artist who brings with her a strong message of intercultural dialogue. What was the value of having her back in Palermo after the 2014 concert, more than ten years later?

A: Noa's return after more than a decade

Five years after her first concert in Palermo for Rotary, in an era of growing tension and division, she has taken on a value that goes beyond pure musical entertainment. Having her here, at this historic moment, meant rekindling a spotlight on these values, reminding us that art can and must be an instrument of hope. Palermo is, by its very nature, a crossroads of cultures, a city with Arab, Norman, Jewish, and Christian influences in its history. Choosing this stage for a message of intercultural dialogue was certainly not a coincidence, but a symbolic choice. For me, it was like reconnecting with a friend I hadn't seen in a long time, and discovering that, despite everything that has happened and is happening in the world, shared values remain intact and more precious than ever.

Q10. Media coverage also played a role in highlighting the event. How do you assess the impact the press and media had in spreading the message of peace and solidarity beyond local borders?



A: The impact of media coverage on Noa's concert was, in my opinion, fundamental in transforming transform a local event into a message of national and, potentially, international significance. Without the action of the press and the media, the message of peace and solidarity would have remained confined only to participants. The press, websites, radio stations, bus posters, and billboards acted with

great force and

determination, telling

the story not only of the concert, but also of the values that inspired it. Articles and television reports described his artistic project "Re-Imagine-Peace" by reporting the artist's words on stage. The media coverage has transformed the evening into a real communications event. Even the Rotary Italia magazine, although it does not have the same broad reach as a national news program, final, it was extremely effective, because reaches people who are already prepared to

Q11. Looking to the future, what impact do you hope this event will have on District 2110?

A: I hope that Noa's concert leaves lasting traces in the District 2110, making this This event with this extraordinary artist will be a source of inspiration and a model worth replicating. The greatest impact is not just the money raised for RF, but the tangible demonstration of what can be achieved when strength and passion are combined. My hope is that the District will continue to work together on ambitious and sustainable projects, fostering vitality and innovation within Rotary.

Pakistan's President Aziz Memon met with Pakistani Prime Minister Mian Shehbaz Sharif and senior government officials last month to review polio vaccinations in the Asian country, where resistance to the poliovirus remains at worrying levels. The meeting took place at the National Emergency Operation Center for Polio Eradication.

The President International Francesco Arezzo thanked the Pakistani government and the generous support of its polio partners for providing a thorough update and for continuing to lead the vaccination campaign in Pakistan with determination and compassion. "Together," President Arezzo concluded, "we are not just fighting the virus, but we are fighting for the future, for dignity, and for every child's right to thrive."

WHO Pakistan was pleased to meet with Rotary International leadership to discuss continued support and global collaboration with End Polio Now to protect millions of children in Pakistan and around the world.

During International President Francesco Arezzo's visit, vaccine doses were administered to some children present. The World Health Organization of Pakistan thanked Rotary International for its continued support and for visiting the regional polio reference laboratory accredited by the World Health Organization in Pakistan. This laboratory provides a scientific response to End Polio Now, processing thousands of samples annually for the largest international poliovirus surveillance network.



On July 27, 2025, the traditional summer festival of the "I Girasoli" association was held at the "Lo Sperone" riding school in Alcamo.


For about thirty years, the aforementioned association has been assisting patients with various disabilities, driven by great passion and enthusiasm, resorting to hippotherapy activities.

The Palermo Monreale Rotary Club has adopted the "Casa del sorriso di Monreale" residential community for several years. This non-profit organization was founded in 1968 by Capuchin Fathers Gabriele Russo, Clemente Giadone, and Francesco Paolo Biondolillo. It is a family-based, communitybased residential facility where children live with a team of professional staff (educators and social workers) who perform their educational function as part of their job. The young guests, sometimes with their mothers, are hosted because they need to be separated from their families for short or long periods for various reasons:

Over the years, RC Palermo Monreale, together with the youth of Rotaract, has carried out numerous activities for minors to alleviate their particular situation. While babies and their mothers are provided with a safe, comfortable place and all the care they need, they risk losing daily contact with people other than the attentive staff who care for them. 

The Francesca Morvillo Rotarian Association was founded in Palermo to translate into concrete action the values of justice and legality embodied by juvenile judge Francesca Morvillo, a victim of the 1992 massacres. Founded by Rotary members as "Progetto Artigianato," it is inspired by the Rotary spirit of service, aiming to respond flexibly to local needs. In 2014, it adopted its current name, strengthening its ties with Rotary International and the Panormus area clubs, which have always supported its activities. Over time, the association has consolidated a solid network of collaborations with public bodies, voluntary organizations, and citizens, becoming a point of reference for those experiencing hardship. Its work focuses on improving the quality of life by promoting a more equitable and supportive society. Activities range from social support to inclusion programs for vulnerable groups, education, training, and the promotion of a culture of legality. Since 2015, it has run a clothing distribution service for the needy, while hot meals and toilets are offered directly on the street through a medical camper, with the contribution of five groups of Rotarian volunteers.

The Association operates in various areas: social emergency and poverty, protection of young people and minors, health promotion, support for the homeless, culture

and legality. Among the active projects: Casa Clochard, On the Street for the Disadvantaged, Mobile Medical Camper, Hygiene First, and Directing the Disadvantaged, to promote social reintegration. The organizational structure is clear and functional. President Giancarlo Grassi leads the Association, supported by a Board of Directors, working committees for each area of intervention, and an Operations Secretariat that manages the administrative side and day-to-day coordination. Everyone works together to ensure efficiency, transparency, and social impact. The beating heart of the Association is its people. Rotarian members have believed in the project since its inception, providing expertise and resources. Volunteers from diverse backgrounds represent the concrete face of solidarity: with passion, energy, and dedication, they offer their time and help, actively participating in all activities, particularly the distribution of meals and mobile services.



Among the main programs implemented are: Progetto Artigianato, which gave rise to the project; Banco Alimentare, for the distribution of food; Casa Clochard, for the homeless; Insegnare i disgiusti, which offers reintegration programs; Facciamo squadra insieme, aimed at strengthening the social fabric. Each project is the result of careful planning, geared towards positive impact and inclusive growth in the local area.

Through the active memory of Francesca Morvillo, the association continues to promote values of justice, dignity, and civic participation, with concrete and shared action, always at the service of the community.

This initiative was enthusiastically welcomed by beach resort managers, who also believe it's useful to know first aid techniques on the beach, where the risk of encountering dangerous situations is greater. The many attendees also participated with great enthusiasm, challenging themselves and practicing, under the careful guidance of the BLS instructors, both on the manneguins and on each other, demonstrating that knowing first aid techniques is crucial.

These meetings are part of the broader "cardioprotected coast" project of the Rotary Club Castelvetrano Valle del Belice, which implements the International President's motto "United to do good," ensuring that our area is equipped with AEDs and personnel knowledgeable in first aid techniques.

This is an important step, which goes in the direction that has long been hoped for by citizens.

However, the expected timeframe for the final approval of the plan - which also includes the Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) process raises several concerns. It is estimated that the process will only be completed in the second half of 2026, a timeframe that risks compromising the effective implementation of projects already funded under the PNRR, the OP ERDF, POC, and Metro Plus funds.

The group welcomes the submission of the PUDM to the Region, considering it a positive but longoverdue signal. A more timely submission, as repeatedly requested to the Municipality in vain, would have averted these risks. Precisely for this reason, the Rotary Club Coordination Committee emphasizes the need for clear and rapid timelines to prevent delays in approving the plan from jeopardizing the







indicate access to resources already allocated.

According to the Coordination
Committee, "it is essential that the
Municipality and Region immediately
engage in operational and
constructive discussions to identify
solutions that will accelerate the
process and ensure full utilization of
the funds earmarked for coastal
redevelopment. Such a significant
opportunity, from an environmental,
social, and economic perspective,
cannot be postponed or jeopardized
by further delays."

The main interventions planned in the South Coast area amount to over 50 million euros. These include the Sperone Seaside Park (16.1 million), the eco-friendly redevelopment of the seafront

Bandita (12 million), the Oreto River and Coast Contract (12 million), the Grassi Free Park (5.7 million) and the redevelopment of the Bandita port (13.7 million), some of which are subject to approval by the PUDM. "Our hope," concludes the Rotary Coordination, "is that the institutions grasp the strategic value of this phase and work together, in a spirit of collaboration and a sense of responsibility, to restore a precious part of their maritime and urban heritage to the city and its citizens. Regenerating the South Coast is not just an urban planning objective: it is a cultural, social, and environmental challenge that concerns the very future of Palermo." Rotary, with its articulations

Messeri, whose specific role is to promote local traditional products by engaging and raising awareness among local institutions, declared his readiness to collaborate on the creation of the UNESCO geopark.

Prof. Markus Egli is known throughout Europe for his studies on the dynamics of



soil and landscape, having carried out several samplings with students from the University of Zurich, highlighted on the big screen the different states that are defined as pedological horizons, underlining how this publication is truly important because it constitutes the first scientific contribution to the indepth understanding of the soils on the glauconitic calcarenites of Corleone.



Another stop was the historic center of Prizzi to admire the murals, created by prestigious Sicilian artists, which adorn the walls of many houses. Hi, my name is Angela, and I returned to Italy 20 days ago after my experience abroad. Before leaving, I remember the conversations with older people who had already been through this experience; I remember them telling me that the hardest part wasn't leaving, but coming back. I also remember thinking to myself, "I can't believe it, it can't be that sad, I'll have lots of friends here waiting for me."

And don't get me wrong, my friends were there waiting for me, but a part of me is still in Wilmington, North Carolina. I began this journey with a lot of positivity, with huge expectations and, above all, curiosity and a desire to grow.

I will always remember the excitement mixed with anxiety, fear and happiness that I felt on that nine-hour outbound flight. I had time to think and process what was happening.

I'm still telling myself. Yet I still find myself repeating it and reminding myself that I went to the other side of the world, to live with "strangers," without knowing a single person, speaking a language that isn't my own, and it still seems surreal. This year has been a mix of ups and downs. I've spent time alone and learned to cope. At the same time, I've thrown myself into new situations without fear of other people's judgment. I feel much more confident in myself and my abilities. I lived in an American school, dressed like them, ate what they ate, learned their language well, and felt like a fullfledged American citizen.

If there's something I'll carry with me forever, it's the people I've met and the impact they've had on me. From the very beginning, I've tried to take as much as possible from them.

Doing a year abroad has been one of the most important things in my life so far, I think anyone with the opportunity and the right mindset should try an experience like this, whether now or at university; traveling, seeing as many places in the world as possible, learning about new cultures and languages is what I hope to do as much as possible in my life and what I believe

I've been fortunate enough to be able to do this over the past few months, and it brings back memories that I will cherish forever.

Over the past year, I've spent countless hours talking with a friend of mine, Marina from Spain, about the weather and how strange it was that it felt like we'd met a lifetime ago and spent so much time together, when only a few months had passed and we were already like sisters.

On June 25th, five days before leaving, I wrote this in my phone notes:



The greatest challenge comes at Christmas, a moment of nostalgia for Monica's absence. But this too passes, between preparing a package, choosing gifts, and the thousand commitments that the

Saying goodbye to Anko, after a year of sharing, wasn't easy. I was starting to miss her soft voice when she said "thank you," and her discreet presence had become essential.

And just as she was leaving for her homeland, accompanied by her parents, who came to pick her up and with whom we spent some wonderful moments, we were taking flight towards that Japan we had learned to love from afar.

Hi everyone,



And I know that one way or another, I'll be back. Because Rotary doesn't just change your perspective, it changes your life.





It's not easy leaving home. But I feel like I'm doing something important and that it will be useful in the future.


I'm learning something new every day, and I thank Rotary for this opportunity. This is just the beginning.

On July 22, 2025, a meeting was held at the Theological Faculty of Sicily in Palermo between the Presidents of the Rotary Clubs of the Panorama Area and the Dean of the Faculty, Father Vito Impellizzeri. The agreement reached with the Governor of District 2110 provides for the start of an operational synergy between the clubs and the academic institution, with the aim of fa-

To promote shared activities within the community. Requests may be submitted by clubs according to mutually agreed-upon procedures. The agreement is part of a process already undertaken by several clubs to strengthen relationships with local academic and cultural institutions, with the aim of creating broader collaborative networks. For its part, the Theological Faculty, with this commitment, confirms its desire to be an active participant in the city's social and civic life.

Participants were guided on an institutional tour of the Faculty's facilities, exploring its facilities, services, and opportunities. The tour included classrooms, libraries, and common areas, highlighting the facility's potential as a venue for events outside of the academic curriculum. District Delegate for Institutions, Pino Di Sclafani, also attended the meeting, overseeing the proceedings and supporting the initiative as part of Rotary's relationships with local institutions.

The agreement does not entail financial commitments, but constitutes a framework for activities that may be developed





Over time, based on the proposals and availability of those involved. Possible areas of collaboration have included thematic meetings, seminars, training courses, and activities aimed at young people and students.

The Theological Faculty of Sicily, an accredited and recognized institution, has played an educational role in theology and religious studies for decades, with a growing openness to dialogue with civil society. Rotary, for its part, intends to collaborate with public and private entities to support projects of social and cultural benefit. The protocol represents a first step in this direction and may be updated or supplemented based on future developments. The hope expressed by both parties is to foster concrete collaboration, based on mutual recognition of roles and the desire to work together for the good of the region.





There was great interest in hearing the travel stories of some members who, like modern-day Marco Polos, have traversed different continents, visiting countries and cities not only nearby but on the other side of the world.

The stories of traveling members, Vito Giovanna, Saro, and Carmelo, conveyed not only their emotions, but also the way they saw the natural beauty of the places they visited. Beppe Cumia, Past President, shared some images that demonstrated the difference between tourists and travelers.

mental, while the monotony of prolonged inactivity or fixed work weaves patterns in the brain that generate prostration and a sense of personal inadequacy." With this spirit, Beppe and Simona reached South Africa, which overlooks the Atlantic Ocean, the Amazon rainforest, Morocco, Brazil, and Argentina, experiencing firsthand the contact with nature and different cultures, which they had previously only known from books.

Giovanna Mammana, in Uzbekistan, retraced part of the long Silk Road itinerary.

Through the beautiful projected images, where the turquoise color of the buildings and clothing predominates, demonstrating that this color represents the only element shared by the different ethnic groups living in this wonderful country we know, especially for the fine craftsmanship of the Bukhara carpets that also decorate our homes. Giovanna with her

His story introduced us to something else, leading us by the hand through ancient madrasas, now transformed into emporiums. Vito conveyed the profound emotion he felt while traveling through India: a country that could be a continent unto itself, with its numerous ethnic groups, languages, religions, and cultural traditions, of which caste division still remains the greatest obstacle to the spread of better economic and social conditions. A country where the most serious contradiction that persists is the widespread poverty that coexists with the wealth of a few, living daily in the same places.

India, where even today, sacred cows still roam peacefully, while motorcycles and large vehicles whiz by. Men and women, dressed in colorful traditional attire, stroll alongside others dressed in Western style.



But everyone has their cell phones glued to their ears, while distracted tourists take selfies against a backdrop of hotels, luxury homes, and dilapidated buildings, while in the background the sacred Ganges flows slowly, welcoming men and animals for the sacred ritual washing.

The pictures of India's Golden Triangle that Vito shared are worth a thousand words. But there remains in Vito the compassion, the pity, which manifests the sensitive soul of the author of the photos and penetrates the heart of the listener.

Regarding India, Diego also shared his experience as a Rotaract member hosted by Indian Rotarians.

Through the words and images Saro shared, the members shared his emotions as he visited Lisbon: the city of light, known to us through the stories of the great Pessoa and Wim Wender's film. These two intellectuals acted as guides for our traveler, leading him through a journey not merely for tourists, but for true travelers seeking something beyond the superficial tourist gaze.

In search of the real Lisbon that Saro defines "dream and melancholy", but also a treasure chest of you-



works of art kept in museums of ancient, modern and contemporary art.

For all, it is enough to mention the Triptych of the Temptations of Saint Anthony, which is located in the National Museum of Ancient Art. Carmelo, from Cambodia to the deep south of Chile is an extraordinary, tireless and indomitable traveler, who remains enchanted by the extraordinary nature that he was able to admire by visiting the archaeological site of Angkor, the ancient capital of the Khmer civilization, with its magnificent temples, enveloped by mangroves, testimony of an era of architectural and cultural grandeur.

Today, it's a city of decay. The photos of the numerous shantytowns, which, to the discerning traveler and not to the selfie-taking tourist, testify to the contradictions of a country where poverty and backwardness are set against an extraordinary backdrop of nature and beauty. Yet, these do nothing to alleviate the plight of the majority of the population, who lack access to even basic services.

How many can say they have rounded Cape Horn like Carmelo, or have shared life with the skilled horsemen who live in the open air to guard and defend the livestock.

It was a deeply emotional evening, especially considering that it was also an opportunity to reflect on the fact that, in many of these places, the Rotary Foundation is present with projects to improve the conditions of local communities, from education to the major vaccination campaign. As Rotarians, we can conclude with Chatwin's words: it was "a true journey of the soul." An evening that went beyond Marco Polo's journey.

The conference offered attendees a fascinating visual and conceptual journey through the iconographic representation of the "Santuzza" during the 17th century, a crucial period not only for popular devotion but also for the evolution of sacred art in Sicily. Professor Palazzotto illustrated how, through paintings, sculptures, and festive displays, the figure of Saint Rosalia assumed a central role in Baroque spirituality and the civic identity of Palermo, especially after the discovery of her relics in 1624 and the miraculous intervention attributed to the Saint during the plague epidemic.

The images and historical references supported the intervention which involved members and guests in

With Don Porta, the Saint's connection with water, an element understood as regeneration, purity, and the source of life, was explored in depth.

The Apostle James was a fisherman in the waters of Lake Tiberias, later called by Jesus to be a fisher of souls. To answer his call, he set out across the Mediterranean, reaching Spain. Water is also represented by the shell, a symbol of pilgrimage. Legend has it that a spring gushed forth at the site where his body was found, and many miracles have been linked to water and healings. The presence of a gourd, used to hold water to guench thirst, is also noteworthy. This unique insight into the church and the saint to whom it is dedicated, was presented by the Rotary Club of Pantelleria to the audience, who remained attentive after the liturgical celebration, appreciating the explanations of Maestro Cossyro and Father Porta.
