These women learned to sew sari blouses, kurta tunics, and salwar suits, enabling them to support themselves and their families. Each woman received a certificate for completing the program, and the sewing machine supplier offered free long-term maintenance. The project provided a vital income and dignity to women marginalized by society after widowhood.

This story is an example of Rotary leadership in action: local people with solutions that address the needs of their communities. Our role is not to provide charity or impose external models, but to promote self-reliance by investing in leadership, skills, and sustainable entrepreneurship.

This October, I invite Rotary members around the world to reflect on economic leadership in their communities. Who is stepping up to lead local economic initiatives? Where is untapped talent that could be supported with training or mentoring? 

Always with the same spirit: United to Do Good!














Note, wines and sunsets at the Stagnone of Marsala AND wind pro Rotary Froundation



ROTARY YOUTH AND XCHANGE ROTARY OPENS BORDERS FOR INTERNATIONAL GROWTH

"I have seen boys and girls leave, and I have seen men and women return": with these words, Pucci Piccione, Youth Exchange Program Coordinator for District 2110, sums up the essence and profound value of the Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE), a concrete opportunity for international training, personal growth, and peacebuilding.

Today more than ever, in a world that is building walls, Rotary builds bridges between people, promoting experiences of dialogue, friendship, and mutual discovery, and has been doing so for over 50 years, through this historic, globally recognized youth exchange program. District 2110 Sicily and Malta also strongly believes in this transformation process and has always invested in young people, the drivers of change. Now, under the leadership of Governor Sergio Malizia, District 2110 renews its commitment with a highly qualified and motivated District Commission led by District Coordinator Pucci Piccione, with the Western Area Coordinators Vito Cocita (RC Valle del Salso) and the Eastern Area Coordinators Giovanna Tumino (RC Ragusa Hybla Heraea), together with the members: Roberto Angileri (RC Enna), Michele Bacchi (RC Sciacca), Salvatore Bottone (RC Marsala), Alessandro Liberto (RC La Valette, Malta), Alessia Mauri (RC Catania), Doriana Montella (RC Catania Sud), Fernanda Paternò Castello di Carcaci (RC Catania), Tommaso Maria Puccio (RC Palermo Mondello), Alberto Sardella (RC Messina), Gianluca Sartorio (RC Palermo Mediterranea) and Sergio Spinoso (RC Siracusa Ortigia). The team led by Pucci Piccione focuses on listening, caring for, and supporting the children and their families, both upon departure and arrival. But what is the "Rotary Youth Exchange"? It's an educational and cultural program that offers young people between the ages of 15 and 19 the opportunity to live abroad for a period, living with selected, welcoming families, attending local schools, and participating in the social and Rotary life of the host community. The program is divided into

different modalities: Long Term Exchange (a school year abroad), Short Term Exchange (4-6 weeks, often with reciprocal exchange between families), Summer Camps (15-20 days, cultural or sports experiences in a group) and NGSE (New Generations Service Exchange) for young adults (18-30 years old). For everyone, it's a life-changing experience, as Pucci Piccione emphasizes in the interview: "The Youth Exchange opens minds and hearts." Young people learn to understand themselves, overcome their fears, face change, and acquire new languages and intercultural skills. They return more independent, confident, and responsible. And often profoundly transformed. Many then work abroad, others return to live and invest in their communities.

own territories with an international mentality. Each participant is supported with passion and responsibility by a tutor, selected families, and active clubs that are part of their community.

However, as mentioned in the interview, currently only a little over 20% of the District's clubs are involved in the program. This is why it's important to strengthen the culture of exchange within clubs, overcome fears related to responsibility, and understand that accompanying a young person on this journey means sowing peace and building the future. PUCCIPICCIONE: LIN TRUST OF ROTARY IN THE YOUTH OF THE FUTURE

How much attention does Rotary International devote to young people? And how much does our District? Rotary International recognizes the profound importance of highlighting the creativity, passion, and role of young people in society through programs and projects that, at various levels, seek to enhance their leadership skills. Among these is Rotary Youth Exchange, which celebrates its fiftieth anniversary this year. Our District has always supported youth programs and projects, although many clubs lack full participation. This is demonstrated by the still relatively small percentage, just over 20%, of clubs participating in Youth Exchange. We often sense within clubs a fear of taking on responsibility.



What growth opportunities does Rotary offer young people?

Rotary offers the opportunity for young people to engage in a



direct and responsible service in their own territory through Interact and Rotaract, the opportunity to explore the world and learn other languages and new cultures with the "Youth Exchange" in its various forms: Long Term, Short Term, and Camp, and offers the opportunity, through the RYLA experience, to attend a leadership course which becomes, in many situations, the only real opportunity offered to young people to exchange and learn about experiences and values. From your vantage point, what results have the kids who participate in the exchange projects designed for them achieved?

I've always said that I've seen girls and boys leave and I've seen women and men return. The exchange project, especially the Long Term one, allows



Youth Exchange opens minds and hearts, making us understand that the world is, after all, much smaller than we think, and that it doesn't take much to be friends.

Do we have aggregate data on the actual opportunities these children had after participating in these exchange programs thanks to their commitment to our District?

There are no statistical or otherwise detailed data that allow us to have a clear picture, over time, of how the exchange experience has also become a professional and life opportunity for the young people who participated. It would be useful, in this regard, to begin to define a comprehensive and specific context. It is our personal experience that manages to outline how many young people have been able to:

First and foremost, it's about knowing yourself, especially because, especially in the initial stages, you experience the fear of a new environment, the lack of your comfort zone, the distance from friends and family, and the difficulty of speaking a new language that you often don't know. It's therefore essential to develop your creativity, your desire to learn, and your passion for things. Through this human and natural process, it becomes natural to recognize your strengths (to enhance them and share them with others) and also your limitations (to overcome them and not be afraid of them). You acquire an international outlook and very often return fluent in multiple languages and with a surprising confidence in your abilities. It's no coincidence that many young people who have had the RYE experience work abroad, with great success and prospects.





diverse concerns, but the beauty and originality of the program have allowed us to fully resume all activities. The exchange program in our District is now completely financially selfsustaining, but if we want to give it greater relevance, we need to allocate additional financial resources to a new project. This involves identifying responsible and highly motivated individuals, including through rewards. This project can also involve more clubs, ensuring a strong presence in schools, no longer sporadic but constant. Above all, it can involve the rebounders—the young people who have participated in the exchange—as true and authentic witnesses to the beauty and strength of the program. They are the first witnesses, and they, better than anyone else, can share their stories, their journey, their emotions, and recount Rotary's service around the world.

I am still experiencing new and

fully utilize, in their professional and personal lives, what they had experienced during the exchange, and we can also confirm that many young people who spent their year in our District return because they have a strong connection to the places and people. I saw many girls and boys who returned with their families or partners, and many who chose to work and live in Sicily or who came here on vacation or to get married, for example. The bonds that are created during the exchange experience

exchanges remain forever and this is an element of strength and guarantee of the program, but also of beauty and personal joy.

How much has interest in Rotary's youth program grown among young people, families, and schools, and what more can be done to improve the dissemination of information about the important opportunities it offers?

What do you think is the real key to the success of the Rotary youth program? I'd say it's rooted in Rotary: spontaneous collaboration and a positive attitude toward the future. It's important to remember that the program works because there's always a Rotarian, anywhere in the world, who, completely selflessly, stands beside the kids and helps them live their life experiences in a peaceful and harmonious way.

AND THE CULTURE OF DONATION

Rotary International's history of service began in the last century and has developed over the years thanks to the work and service of Rotarians and the culture of giving that distinguishes our Association. The most important milestones we recall are:

1978 Promotion of the 3H (Health, Hunger and Humanity) program, in which Rotary is committed to combating hunger, disease, and social conflict. The first act of this program is the allocation of \$760,000 for polio vaccination.





for 6 million children in the Philippines;

1985: Rotary launches the PolioPlus Program, one of the most ambitious humanitarian programs undertaken by a private organization, with an initial fundraising goal of \$120 million and a commitment to vaccinating children in polio-affected countries. Its creator and promoter is Sergio Mulitsch, a Rotarian emeritus, founding member of the RC Treviglio e Pianura Bergamasca, and Governor of District 204 in 1984-85.

In 1988, Rotary and the World Health Organization launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), joined by UNICEF, the CDC, and the Melinda and Bill Gates Foundation. At the time, there were approximately 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries. Thanks to GPEI, the eco-commitment



The vaccination program becomes even more important and vaccination programs are expanding on a global scale, allowing the first successes to be achieved.

In 1994, WHO declared the Americas polio-free, and in 2000, the Western Pacific region, stretching from Australia to China, was also declared polio-

In 2003, The Rotary Foundation raised \$119 million during a 12month campaign. Rotary's total contribution to polio eradication exceeded \$500 million.

Six countries remain polioendemic - Afghanistan, Egypt, India, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan. In 2006 the number of polioendemic countries dropped to four - Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, Pakistan.

And in 2020, WHO certified the African continent as wild polio-free. Today, wild poliovirus 1 (WPV1) is present only in Pakistan and Afghanistan, but the problem is also represented by the spread, in other countries of the world, of virulent strains of vaccine-derived polioviruses (cVDPVs), present in the environment, which constitute a serious risk to public health. The eradication strategy

The key to disease control continues to be vaccination, adopting new vaccination schedules, increasing interventions, and using more stable, new-generation vaccines. However, it is necessary to invest in research, epidemiological and environmental surveillance, new technologies, vaccines, and to promote and strengthen the culture of blood donation. It was with this very objective that the PolioPlus Society (PPS) was born in 2012, from the intuition of Harriet Shloer of the Rotary Club "Bend High Desert", District 5110 (Oregon and Northern California), which over the years has spread to other districts around the world.

In the Rotary year 2024-2025, the PPS is founded in District 2110, by will of the Governor-

King Giuseppe Pitari on the initiative of

phanie Urchick who places the diffusion of PPS among the objectives of his year in office. Raising awareness of a historic yet highly topical problem such as the spread of the polio virus and promoting recurring annual donations to the End Polio Fund are the primary objectives of PPS.

Rotarians and Rotaractors join the PPS with a moral commitment to contribute at least €100 annually to purchase vaccines, support vaccination campaign logistics, and conduct epidemiological surveillance until the World Health Organization declares the world polio-free.

PPS members receive a Certificate of Recognition and a special membership badge from the Governor.

The donation is recognized individually for Paul Harris Fellow, Benefactor, or Major Donor status and helps increase the contributions of the member clubs to the Polio Plus Fund.

PPS currently has 114 members, representing approximately 50% of the district's clubs, but this number is expected to grow thanks to the commitment of Governor Sergio Malizia and the PolioPlus Society Committee. PPS members are Rotary Ambassadors in its most ambitious fight; they maintain personal commitment and actively promote the culture of giving. PPS's commitment is part of Rotary's larger global effort to eradicate polio, championed by International President Francesco Arezzo di Trefiletti.

Thanks to the extraordinary progress achieved so far, polio eradication is within reach, but the END POLIO goal requires a International Ste-further effort and commitment constant.

UNIPA & ROTARYSOS API STRUST AGAINST A FUTURE AT RISK OF EXTINCTION

On September 26, 2025, the European Researchers' Night -SHARPER Project celebrated science; but it was also the stage for an important collaboration. The excellence of the UniPA-SAAF Department and the fieldwork of Rotary District 2110 with the SOS Bees project. Together, scientific discovery and commitment that goes beyond the laboratory raise a silent alarm that threatens the planet: the risk of bee extinction. The event was a marathon (6 p.m.-12 a.m.) with 3,000 visitors at 120 stands and more than 500 researchers, despite the initial adverse weather conditions. It was thrilling to welcome the

Many, young and old, flocked to our stand to learn more. An interactive experience exploring the world of bees revealed their crucial role and the dangers they face. It transformed research into entertainment and awareness into concrete action; they tangibly understood an uncomfortable truth: our future hangs on the thin thread of pollination! Through it, we have food and oxygen! The urgency of this mission is captured in the words of Sergio Malizia. Governor of District 2110: "Bees can't scream. We will do it for them. Their silence would be our greatest loss."









Luigi Loggia, president of the SOS Bee Commission, the protagonist of the evening for Rotary, thanked the Rector of the University of Palermo, Professor Massimo Midiri, who was at the stand to greet us and certify its success; Professor M. Gruttadauria, organizational coordinator of the "Night," "for encouraging us to participate"; and the researchers from the SAAF Department who "welcomed us with kindness and competence." The goal, explained Professor Lo Verde, professor of entomology at the SAAF-UNIPA Department, was clear: to involve: and she declared: "We want everyone, from children to adults, to understand that saving bees is a collective mission." The event concluded with an echo of enthusiasm: "Science is an adventure," explained Professor Michelangelo Gruttadauria, coorganizer, "since 2016 we have been telling it in an ever-changing and engaging way through the SHARPER project. With Rotary, it also becomes action!"

A rainbow of colors illuminates Palermo with a timeless message: peace. On Via Emerico Amari, right in front of the port, the work "Steles of Peace" was installed. last September 21st, at the first edition of the Peace Festival, coordinated by the Association "Friends of Ukraine".








The demonstration began with a gathering in Piazza Vittorio

The demonstration ended in Piazza Mauro Rostagno and on this occasion space was given to a forum on " *Peoples beyond borders*" with the intervention of the mayor of Trapani Giacomo Tranchida, the mayor of Erice Daniela Toscano, the police commissioner Giuseppe Felice Peritore and the extraordinary commissioner of the ASP Sabrina Pulvirenti.

Nine mayors and two rectors from Ukraine spoke of bombed communities, cities that resisted, and schools that continue to operate online despite the occupation. Collaboration agreements were signed with the Italian municipalities of the D50 Social and Health District, led by Trapani. The president of the Rotary Club

Trapani Birgi Mozia, Maria Elvira **De Luca**, commented "The walk alongside Ukrainian representatives with the pleasure of exchanging fraternal hugs and who appreciated the presence of Rotary, an international institution that does so much good and fights for the affirmation of peace in the world, was a moment of growth and full of deep emotion." Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is a rare genetic disease but is the most common of the serious genetic diseases.

It affects 1 in 3,000 newborns; in Italy, two babies are born with CF every week, 100 new cases a year.

The genetic mutation on the CFTR gene finds clinical expression when it is present in double copy in the DNA (homozygosity), therefore for it to be transmitted both parents must be carriers, that is, have only one copy of the mutated gene; carriers are by definition healthy and unaware, but a parental couple with two healthy carriers can have a child affected by CF in a rate of 1 in 4.

A child born with CF presents a series of com-

complex clinical problems, prolonged antibiotic therapies, being able to conceive a child, such as growth disorders

for months, respiratory

to FC if at least one member of

to, pancreatic insufficiency, diabetes, infertility, but above all there is an alteration of the mucus of the respiratory tract that leads patients to repeated infections, respiratory failure, lung transplant and death. Today, thanks to research and new therapies, the average life expectancy is around 50 years (in the past, patients did not live beyond pediatric age).

The National Health System takes care of these complex patients and employs significant professional and economic resources ensuring: neonatal screening, diagnosis and treatment pathways at highly specialized centers present in every region (



in Sicily (Palermo-Catania-Messina), recurrent hospitalizations,

for months, respiratory physiotherapy, oxygen therapy, lung transplant and re-transplant, benefits of law 104, logistical and psychological support for caregivers, etc, etc, etc. Despite all this effort, absolutely nothing has been done by the NHS to raise awareness among the general population and the medical profession about the possibility of carrying out the Healthy Carrier Test (a genetic test that identifies the CFTR mutation). before conception. Yet the test has been known for over twenty years and the execution of the test identifies 9 out of 10 healthy carriers lowering the risk of being born

with CFfrom 1 in 3000 newborns to 1 in

they can know the genetic risk before conception conceive a child, such as growth to FC if at least one member of the couple takes the test and can therefore undertake a path to conscious parenting.

Even though it is a rare disease, the problem of Healthy Carriers concerns each of us, it concerns our children, our grandchildren, girls and boys of childbearing age and it concerns us because Healthy Carriers are present in the general population to the extent of one in thirty; The healthy carrier is one of us, one among us and he doesn't know it, he is by definition healthy and unaware of his genetic risk but can transmit the mutation. I proposed the national project to the District (and I still thank them for the trust they have placed in me)"1 in 30 and doesn't know iti " with the aim of making my experience as a doctor and volunteer for the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation available to Rotary and the strength of the District available to the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation (FFCr) which can do an extraordinary job for this project, can act as a multiplier and amplifier of the message and help fill the information gap that no one has addressed for years. To achieve this goal, in Rotary Year '25-'26 the District Cystic Fibrosis Committee intends to accomplish the following:

- Awareness-raising meetings in as many clubs as possible in the district, involving, when possible, local FFCr volunteers, patients and caregivers who can share their experiences.
- Awareness-raising meetings with Rotaract members, who are the intended recipients of the message and who can support social initiatives to raise awareness among the general population. This initiative will also involve volunteers, where possible.

-"Let's light up Sicily":During the week of October 20-26, 2025, in close collaboration with FFC Ricerca, which is promoting the initiative nationally, and involving, where possible, FFC Ricerca volunteers (Delegations and Groups), and with the support of ANMI (National Association of Italian Municipalities), we will light the symbolic monuments of Sicilian municipalities green to support the national initiative that last year saw 70 monuments in Italian cities illuminated in green. This symbolic gesture will raise awareness of Cystic Fibrosis and the carrier test.

- we will distribute information brochures in sensitive places (gyms, pharmacies, clinics, general practitioners, laboratories....etc) using the information material

The initiative's project was developed by FFC Ricerca and on which it will be possible, after mutual sharing, to place the Rotary District 2110 logo. We will seek institutional contacts to raise awareness of the project, and as citizens, we will ask them to initiate the bureaucratic process that could lead to the free provision of the test by the Sicily Region, as is already the case in the Veneto Region, which provides the test free of charge to women between the ages of 18 and 50. For this initiative, we will also be able to count on the support of the FFC Ricerca headquarters, which, at the national level, is engaging several regions in Italy to launch similar pilot projects.





A large number of people gathered in Piazza Santa Flavia in Caltanissetta at 9:00 PM on September 1, 2025, to embark on a fascinating nighttime walk to discover the ancient course of the stream that ran from Santa Venera to Ponticello, in the city's historic center. The fascinating discovery trail, organized as part of "Le Notti di BC Sicilia" (The Nights of BC Sicily) for the protection and enhancement of cultural and environmental heritage, actively involved the presidents and members of local service clubs and associations, as well as many citizens who came out to support the initiative: Nevilia Aquilina, President of Inner Wheel, DoProfessor Bonelli, President of the Caltanissetta dei Castelli Lions Club, Ivana Guarneri, President of the Rotary Club, Paolina Lo Bue, President of the CL Lions Club, and Gabriella Urso, President of the La Ferula Garden Club, were all coordinated by the Regional President of BC Sicilia, Alfonso Lo Cascio, who concluded the presentation of the event in the Church of Santa Flavia and gave the floor to two expert speakers: Giuseppe Giugno, President of the Alchimia Association, and Luigi Santagati, Local Historian. Professor Giugno, with a wealth of historical notes and precise architectural details, guided the participants through a thorough understanding of the Church of Santa Flavia Sanctuary.

retraced the history of the church, from its foundation in the late 1500s, at the behest of Aloisia De Luna Vega, to the present day, revealing very interesting details both about the works on display and those lost forever. He was able to identify the original nucleus of the church, consisting of the small church of Santa Venera, later incorporated into the church of Santa Flavia. After visiting the courtyard, Professor Luigi Santagati and his assistants followed the route that led from the cisterns collecting water from the hill behind to the historic center, specifically to the first Moncada houses. He then revealed the existence of nowburied pipes and the original route of the stream that reached the Santa Lucia area. The historian illustrated several stages with great detail and references to historical documents, captivating and intriguing the participants. They once again demonstrated their interest and sensitivity in promoting the historical and architectural beauty of our city, its illustrious history, which they believe should be used as a catalyst for the rebirth of Central Sicily. The Rotary Club of Catania has always been sensitive and committed to this issue and could not fail to offer its organizational and outreach support.

This will allow the creation of a true open-air museum, as announced in a brief speech by Professor Barone, director of the museum at the University of Catania.




It was also an opportunity to make known the precious sunken treasures, the presence of archaeological finds on the seabed (Roman ships lying at the entrance to the port of Ognina with a load of amphorae, possible submerged port structures, traces of ancient settlements). Carmelo Mannino and Francesco Balestrazzi of the Scuba Diving School showed their valuable underwater footage. Seabed cleanup and restoration efforts are also planned.

The eight information stands will display the marina map not only in normal characters but also in Braille and QR Code, allowing for maximum sharing even for the blind and hearing impaired.

Several professional associations (Italian Union of the Blind, AFAE, AIPD) and cultural organizations such as Slow Food (which will enhance the project by promoting local seafood, what the people of Catania call "masculini") and local fishermen have announced their operational support for the initiative.





The researcher piqued the interest of those present by explaining how to search for stars and the sonification process, reproducing the "sound of the stars." She showed the tactile models that NASA has created in 3D for the visually impaired and blind, based on the suggestions of the Palermo researchers. The activities that

During the tour, it was possible to view the astronomical instruments that - at the time - made the Observatory avant-garde in Europe: the Ramsden Circle, created by the English builder J. Ramsden; the telescope in the Meridian Hall; and the marvelous Dome that is the emblem of this place. Among the most precious equipment is also the telescope that belonged

Vincenzo Morgante, the tennis technical advisor for FISDIR (Italian Federation of Paralympic Sports for Intellectual and Relational Disabilities), a Sicilian native who works in Pordenone, spoke to us about this packed program. FISDIR was able to count on the support of the local committee, led by Giuseppe Cobisi and his team, as well as other representatives of the



Fisdir, such as Gaspare Majelli, national councilor, and Roberta Cascio, regional delegate. The president of the Rotary Club of Caltanissetta, Ivana Guarneri, and her members hosted a joyful breakfast and lunch for the entire group of over 20 Paralympic athletes, their companions, and the organizers. During the meetings with these special athletes, they revealed the rich experiences they had gained in this important tournament.

The boys have indeed grown in cognitive and interpersonal skills, and in independence. It's a fun and engaging activity that makes me feel even more a part of this culture.



Rotaract Catania Est also achieved a sporting achievement.

"But what will truly remain," declared President Di Bella, "are the landscapes we crossed, the complicity of the crew, the smiles along the way, and the thrill of having lived a dream and transformed it into service.



CCONFERENCE ON THE POLLUTION AND TO ENVIRONMENT

A concrete, passionate and rigorous debate on the future of our planet animated the conference "Pollution and environmental sustainability", promoted by the Rotaract Club Palermo Montepellegrino (led by Marco Raneri), with the support of the sponsoring Rotary Club and the participation of Professor Antonio Fundarò, lecturer in "Environmental Sustainability" at the University of Palermo. The initiative – hosted in a space open to intergenerational dialogue - represented a moment of shared reflection on one of the most urgent challenges of our time: that of safeguarding the environment, and in particular the seas, increasingly threatened by microplastics, industrial waste and climate change.

In his speech, Fundarò proposed a cultural, not just technical, approach to the ecological issue, recalling that "the environment is not protected by law, but by conscientious choice." He then added: "Sustainability is not a goal, it's a journey. It's the ability to plan for the future without denying the present to those who have no voice. This is why speaking to young people is not only useful, it's necessary." Marco Raneri, president of the Rotaract Club, reiterated the profound meaning of Rotaract's commitment: "We wanted to shine a light on an issue that concerns each of us. We are young, but we know that every daily action can contribute to protecting the environment."

environment. For us, sustainability is a lifestyle, not a slogan."

A special message was delivered by the president of the Rotary Club of Palermo Montepellegrino, Freda Liotta, who highlighted the value of intergenerational synergy: "Educating for sustainability means building bridges between knowledge and generations.
